

OPERATING INSTRUCTION

Patent Generic Walkie Talkie

HOW TO OPERATE

1. Open "BATTERY DOOR" and snap in a 9 volt battery.
2. Turn the "ON/OFF" switch to "ON"
3. Press the "PUSH-TO-TALK" button for transmitting, and speak in a normal voice level into the "SPEAKER /MICROPHONE" grille, holding the set 8 cm from your mouth.
4. To send MORSE CODE signals, depress the "PUSH-TO-TALK" button, and press the "MORSE CODE KEY". Release morse code key quickly to send a (dot).
5. You can practice MORSE CODE without transmitting to other units by pressing the code key without depressing the "PUSH-TO-TALK" button.
6. Release the "PUSH-TO-TALK" button for receiving.
7. Uses 2 standard 9 Volt batteries (not included)
8. Up to 200 feet range. (The maximum transmission range will depend on the terrain and environment.)
